

Range extension for Crimson-crested Woodpecker in coastal Paraíba, north-east Brazil

Crimson-crested Woodpecker *Campephilus melanoleucus* is fairly common from Panama across northern and central South America⁷. In Brazil, the species inhabits forest, tall second growth, palm groves and plantations^{4,6}.

During avifaunal monitoring work in the vicinity of an industrial area, during 2012–13 (total effort 28 days), we observed several Crimson-crested Woodpeckers in the municipality of Conde, northern Paraíba, north-east Brazil. The first records were on 24 and 29 June 2012, when IPF observed a pair in the canopy of riparian forest ($07^{\circ}14'10''S$ $34^{\circ}53'81''W$; 36 m). On 15–16 May 2013, c.2 km to the west, we observed another individual, and on 7 December 2013 IPF observed and tape-recorded (www.xeno-canto.org; XC 168699) one in a canopy tree along the rio Água Boa, a tributary of the rio Gramame, within a mosaic of *restinga*, *tabuleiro* woodland, riverine forest and sugarcane, on the coast of Paraíba².

Our observations extend the species' range to coastal Paraíba. The rio Água Boa is c.240 km south-east of Santana do Matos, Rio Grande do Norte (www.wikiaves.com; WA239452), c.300 km east of Sertão de Piranhas

in Paraíba⁵, and 500 km from Milagres, Ceará³, the three closest localities reported for the species. Surveys of the *tabuleiros* and remnant Atlantic Forest in coastal Paraíba and Rio Grande do Norte, where the species is presently unknown^{1,5,8}, may yield further records.

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
