First record of Burrowing Owl Athene cunicularia in Amazonian Ecuador

On 4 and 7 August 2013, on sandbars in the río Napo opposite Pilche (00°30'S 75°24'W; 220 m), TCM, DJH & D. Galarza noticed two owls, which on the second date had moved c.100 m upstream. Because Burrowing Owl Athene cunicularia had not previously been recorded in eastern Ecuador¹, the identification was confirmed through reference to Ridgely & Greenfield¹ and Schulenberg et al.2. The following features were noted: broad white eyebrow, no ear-tufts, long bare tarsi, white spots on back and wings; one individual had a rusty-brown throat and creamy belly, the other had creamy-buff underparts with incomplete, ochre-brown barring (Fig. 1).

For Peru, Schulenberg *et al.*² mentioned that the species is

occasionally seen on young river islands in Amazonia, further supporting our observation. In Ecuador, this owl was previously known only from the south-west of the country and the inter-Andean highlands. Given their pale coloration, we suspect the

subspecies involved was *carrikeri*, which otherwise ranges from lowland eastern Colombia to west-central Venezuela. This is the first record of Burrowing Owl for Amazonian Ecuador.
