Trustees' Report for the year ended 31 December 2015

The Members of the Council of the Neotropical Bird Club, who act as Trustees for the purposes of Charity law, are pleased to present their annual report and the accounts for the year ended 31 December 2015.

Constitution and objectives

The Neotropical Bird Club (also known as 'NBC') was formed under a trust deed and registered as a charity on 16 August 1994.

Its main objectives and aims can be summarised as to:

- foster an interest in the birds of the Neotropics amongst birdwatchers throughout the world;
- increase awareness of the importance of support for conservation in the region;
- mobilise the enthusiasm of birdwatchers active in the region to contribute to the conservation of Neotropical birds;
- provide a forum for articles and notes about Neotropical birds, their identification and conservation through the publication of the Club's journals; and
- provide small grants to fund ornithological and conservation projects within the Neotropics.

Review of Club activities during the year

During the year, NBC continued with the publications strategy introduced in 2009 and produced one large issue of *Cotinga* and two issues of *Neotropical Birding*.

Neotropical Birding 16 and 17

Issues 16 and 17 of *Neotropical Birding* continued the trend set by previous issues and included many colour images of rarely seen or photographed species. The articles in *Neotropical Birding* 16 included:

- the identification of Black and Markham's Storm-petrels off Peru;
- recently funded NBC Conservation Awards; and
- the 'LSU Peru Big Day' in 2014.

Articles in Neotropical Birding 17 included the:

- the discovery of breeding colonies of Markham's Storm-petrel in Chile;
- birding possibilities at Serranía del Perijá in Colombia;
- · pelagic birding off north-east Brazil; and
- a photospot on the globally threatened Chestnut-capped Piha.

Cotinga 37

A wide variety of articles were also published in Cotinga 37 with these including:

- the avifauna of Cajas National Park and Mazán Reserve in southern Ecuador;
- the rare birds in French Guiana 2008-10; and
- an ornithological inventory from the rio Cotacajes in Bolivia.

The short communications were equally varied and included details of the first record of Eurasian Wigeon for Cuba, details of the nest, eggs and nestlings of Greater Scythebill and observations of Olive-spotted Hummingbird in south-east Peru.

Conservation Awards

The other major Club activity is funding conservation projects and during 2015 five awards were made (2014: 9). The Club funded £4,558 in grants during the year (2014: £6,548), which means that over the last 16 years £70,285 has been provided to support Neotropical bird conservation projects.

Projects funded in 2015 were as follows:

- US\$1,200 for an environmental education programme on the critically endangered Whitewinged Guan in Peru;
- US\$1,200 towards a monitoring and conservation programme of the endemic and endangered birds in the Pernambuco Centre of Endemism in Brazil;
- US\$1,300 for a study of stranded seabirds in three priority areas in Chile;
- US\$1,400 for a study of a new species of Mountain-gem hummingbird in the Cerro Hoya National Park, Panama; and
- US\$1,500 towards a study of Solitary Eagles in Cordoba province of Argentina.

Other activities

On 25 July 2015, the Club held its Spring meeting and Annual General Meeting in Cambridge. The event included talks on several Neotropical topics covering a range of topics. These included the endemics of North-east Brazil, three decades of birding in Venezuela and a review of the state of the birds in the Neotropics.

In August 2015, the Club had a stand at the Rutland Bird Fair, with the Club's main prizes in its annual raffle being a pair of Swarovski EL binoculars. The Club would like to thank Swarovski Optik for their ongoing support in providing prizes for this annual fundraising event.

In September 2015, the bird tour company BirdQuest and Fauna Paraguay organised a highly successful tour to Paraguay on behalf of the club with those who participated seeing a great selection of the regional specialities.

During the year, the Club continued to operate a Facebook site.

Membership

Membership of the Club increased during the year to 801 (2014:778).

Review of the Club's financial activities

From a financial perspective, 2015 was a highly satisfactory year for the Club with total income of £46,458 (2014: £36,208). Whilst membership subscriptions continue to be the main source of the Club's unrestricted income, Council would like to thank the organisations and individuals who made donations during the year, especially the Tides Foundation, whose ongoing support makes a significant difference to the amount and number of conservation awards which could be funded.

The club also received £9,420 from BirdQuest following the tour they organised for the club to Paraguay.

The £18,536 spent on producing and distributing journals was the most significant expenditure which the Club incurred (2014: £19,023).

Policies:

Reserves policy

The Council have adopted a policy of maintaining the Club's unrestricted funds at a level equivalent to at least one year's normal unrestricted expenditure. They believe this provides appropriate and sufficient funds to ensure the continuation of the Club if, for example, there was a short-term decline in the number of members.

Investment policy

The majority of the Club's funds are held in an interest-bearing account with CAF Bank Limited, the banking arm of the Charities Aid Foundation. In the judgement of the Club's Council, this is currently the most appropriate form of investment for these monies although with interest rates at record lows, the amount earned is currently very low.

Grant-making policy

Grants are made to fund ornithological and conservation projects in the Neotropics and are made both to locally based institutions (typically non-governmental organisations) and to individuals undertaking relevant research on threatened species or habitats. Preference is given to projects undertaken by Neotropical nationals and where NBC's contribution pays for a significant percentage of the work.

In return for providing funding, the Club requests recipients to provide a paper for possible publication in *Cotinga* or *Neotropical Birding* detailing the results of the project.

Risk management

The Club's Council are satisfied that they have sought to identify the major risks faced by the charity and believe appropriate measures have been taken to mitigate these risks.

Members of Council

NEOTROPICAL BIRD CLUB NOTES TO THE ACCOUNTS YEAR ENDED 31st DECEMBER 2015

1. Accounting Policies

General

These accounts have been prepared under the historic cost convention and in accordance with applicable accounting standards and "Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice" ("SORP 2005") issued in March 2005.

Accounting for income

All income is shown gross and is accounted for when receivable.

Subscriptions paid in advance are recognised within creditors. These include life subscriptions which are written off over 25 years.

Expenditure

All expenditure is recognised on an accruals basis.

Charitable activities expenditure includes all costs incurred in relation to the Club's objects, in particular, the costs of printing and distribution of the Club's journals, "Cotinga" and "Neotropical Birding" and grants to support ornithological projects in the Neotropical region.

Management and administration costs represent expenditure incurred on managing the Club's assets and includes the cost of the independent examination of the Club's financial statements, as well as other costs of an administrative nature (see note 7).

Fundraising, trading and publicity expenditure includes the costs of publicising the Club and its activities and raising income.

Grants payable

Grants payable are recognised within the Statement of Financial Activities as soon as they have been approved by the Council.

Fixed assets and depreciation

All tangible fixed assets costing of £75 are capitalised and depreciated over 3 years.

Stock

The stock of good is valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value.

Fund accounting

The Club's funds are divided into 2 separate income funds:

Unrestricted fund

These are on the surpluses and deficits on general Club activities.

Restricted fund

These are amounts given to the Club for a specific purpose and generally to be used for funding conservation awards.

13. Restricted conservation fund

This restricted fund is used to provide grants to support ornithological projects in Middle and South America and the Caribbean. This fund comprises income which has been given to the club specifically to fund conservation awards or has been raised specifically for that purpose.

14. Trustees' expenses

A total of £2,493 (2014: £1,456) was reimbursed to members of the Council during the year for expenses paid by them on behalf of the Club.

15. Related party transactions

During the year, payments to two Trustees totalling £998 became payable which had been approved in advance by the Club's Council and were below the threshold set by the Charity Commission for requiring their prior approval.

These relate to the administration of the Club's Conservation Awards Scheme which has expanded considerably in recent years. The TIDES Foundation which has generously provided the Club with a grant to fund conservation awards agreed that £1,000 of their funding could be used to administer their donation and this will be shared between the two Trustees who run the scheme on behalf of the Club, Jeremy Bird and Alex Lees.
